



Morning-Glories thrive in good soil under a great variety of conditions. Although the bell-shaped flowers are very attractive, farmers do not appreciate their beauty because they grow as weeds in corn and bean fields, causing reduction in yields and making harvesting difficult. The blossoms open at dawn then close several hours later.

MORNING-GLORY

This is the Common Morning-Glory, a well-known garden flower. The bell-shaped, pleated flowers on twining and trailing, hairy stems, range from scarlet to pink, white, blue and purple. The large seeds are occasionally eaten by game-birds. The sweet potato belongs to the Morning-Glory family.
