We use so and such to emphasize adjectives in the same way we use very. We use that after both so and such to introduce a result.

- * The theatre was so smelly in the summer.
- * Shakespeare was such a good writer that everyone loved his plays.

SO + adj/adv

The film was **SO** boring.

It all happened **SO** quickly.

SO + many/few + plural countable noun

There were SO MANY people. She's got SO FEW friends!

SO + much/little + uncountable nouns

I've got SO MUCH work.
I've got SO LITTLE time!

SO + adj/adverb ... + that ... + result

Our teacher is 80 good THAT 1'm sure I'll pass my exams this year.

SUCH

SUCH A + (adj) + countable noun

It was SUCH A surprise to see her again.
That was SUCH A good concert.

SUCH + (adj) + uncountable noun

He talked SUCH nonsense that they laughed. It was SUCH easy work that we finished in five minutes.

SUCH + adjective + plural noun

They were SUCH slow workers that they didn't finish their work.

SUCH (a) + (adj) + noun ... + that ... + result

It was SUCH A beautiful day THAT we decided to go to the park.
